
## Indigenous Research Methodologies

- Ontology theory of the nature of being
- Epistemology theory of the nature of knowledge
- Axiology theory of value
- Methodology must be decolonized
  - Stage 1 Indigenous scholars placed themselves within a western research framework
  - Stage 2 Introduced an indigenous paradigm but within a western framework, struggled not to me marginalized
  - Stage 3 Development of an Indigenous paradigm decolonization –
     (Linda Tuhiwai Smith, 1999)
  - Stage 4 Current state (Steinhauer, 2001)















 Research within Aboriginal Communities can be problematic if it is not informed by Aboriginal peoples themselves, based on ethical knowledge(s) and procedures which locate the protocols of working with Aboriginal peoples within themselves. Research must be approached with integrity and fidelity to these knowledge(s) procedures and protocols. (Atkinson, 2002)
